Welcome to our great school, and thank you for taking the time to make this such a wonderful day. Today we come together to celebrate student achievement.

I'd like to offer my congratulations to all students who received a prize. However, I also want to sincerely thank every student here today who has studied hard to reach their potential. In other words have done their very best. After all isn't that what we all want?

I want to talk to you about the future. At our school we are on a continual cycle of improvement. So what does this mean for you as a parent or carer? Well as teachers, we spend a great deal of time looking at facts and figures, at test results and analysing information about students. We use this information to create the best possible ways of teaching your child.

This information provides us with many opportunities for improvement but it cannot be read in isolation. The reason is that there is one very important factor that underpins everything that happens in a school. It cannot be graphed and it's not a score out of a hundred. This factor is, of course...your child. This unique individual who you have trusted to be educated by us is the person who matters the most and therefore deserves our highest consideration.

I believe that every child can learn, every child can lead and every child can be the very best they can be. It is our job here to assist you, as parents, to ensure your child gets the very best education. Not only in the classroom, or sport or extra curricula activities but also as a human being who will one day become a productive and valued member of our society.

I have always been a passionate and committed teacher who believes in the children I teach. I am so committed to my role as a teacher that if I won the lottery tomorrow I wouldn't just walk out. (Although there maybe some days...") This is because I love the enthusiasm and ongoing commitment of our staff, the friendliness of the students and the excitement for the future that we will create together for your kids. My fellow teachers know well that I have a personal mantra - "What is best for the Kids?". It's written on the wall in my office. It is the measure I use when challenging decisions have to be made.

A good education gives your children choices and will help them know what it is that they really want to do with their life. A good education helps them see other people's points of view and opens their minds to endless possibilities. Student voice has the potential to benefit students, schools and the broader community by increasing student commitment to learning, building connections, a sense of belonging and respectful relationships. It also instils a sense of leadership and personal responsibility for one's future.

I am really excited about the future of teaching and learning at our great school. When we all work together, teachers, parents and students I believe that our children can achieve absolutely anything in their future lives.

I will leave you with a message from Helen Keller. Helen Keller was born in 1880 and she was the first deaf and blind person to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree. She said "Alone we can do so little. Together we can do so much."



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
Protecting Our Children

Schools must be following Department of Education Policies. It must be appreciated that your child's safety is paramount.

Every volunteer in the classroom, canteen, office and with sporting teams, must sign a Child Protection declaration form and provide 100-point identification (if you do not provide a WWCC number).

Parents/Carers transporting team members other than their own child will also be expected to provide a copy of their license, comprehensive insurance and car registration. All paperwork can be completed and presented at the front office. Please note that you only need to do this once in the year and it will be kept on file in the front office.

Parents/Carers of all early leavers must report to the front office to collect an Early Departure slip before collecting a child. The slip must be shown to the teacher to verify that the child has been signed out. Parent/Carers must keep the slip with them when they leave the school, incase they are approached in the street by HSLO's who often work with the police to complete a Street Sweep.
